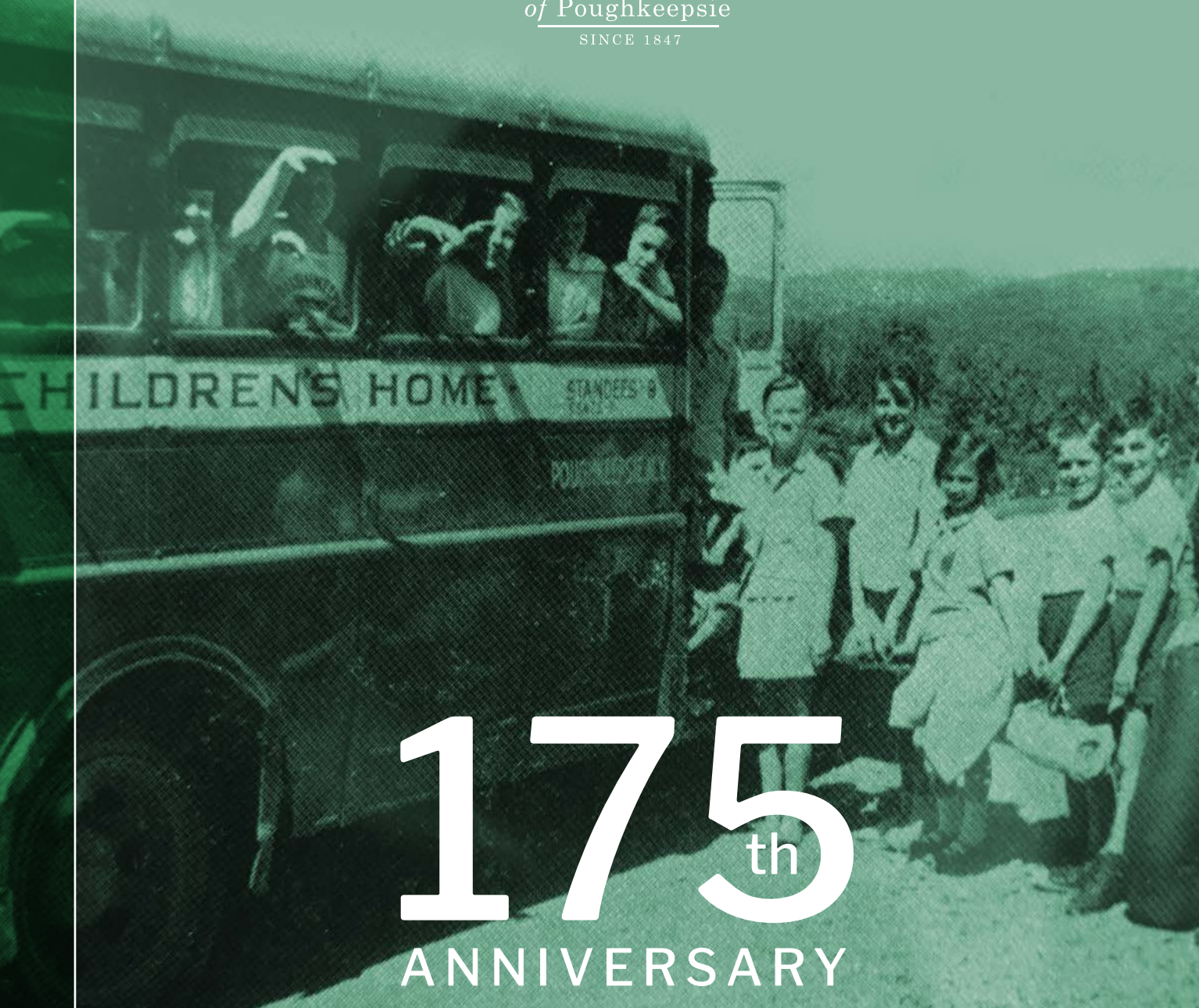

DEAR FRIENDS



This is the 21st annual report letter that I have written as your Executive Director. On January 21, 2022 we celebrated our 175th Anniversary. That's quite an accomplishment.

As you know, the Children’s Home of Poughkeepsie was created on January 21, 1847 by a group of women, the Female Guardian Society, who wanted to help children and families that needed their help the most. Our history tells us, “Two by two they went into the highways and byways, the garrets and cellars; feeding the hungry, clothing the destitute and providing employment and protection for the friendless and exposed.” Thanks to their courage, 175 years later, their mission continues.

Did you know that in 1976 all of the flag-flying in honor of the United States Bi-Centennial inspired our kids to create a Children’s Home flag? A 12-year old youth in-care designed the flag that flew high over our Home. It read “for those who need love and care”. Since our founding, our generous community, dedicated staff and resilient kids have always shown love and care to those that need it the most.



So, when the COVID-19 Pandemic came to our campus and our community in 2020, we knew how we would respond: with love, care, and courage. The COVID-19 pandemic has been the defining and limiting factor for us since it emerged as a threatening disease affecting all aspects of our services. I am so proud of the staff at the Children’s Home for their resilience and courage during the pandemic. I don’t use the term courage lightly. When the COVID-19 pandemic began, none of us knew how dangerous the virus might be. Everyone on our staff who worked with clients exposed themselves and their families to a disease that had no effective treatment and a high level of lethality. **That’s courage.**

Forward. That’s the direction we are going. As you will see in this report, this year marks a pivot point in the Children’s Home history: we are moving rapidly away from residential care to providing an array of services to children and families in their homes and communities. The vision for residential care is for short-term, intensive care, designed to move children back to their families as rapidly as possible. The Children’s Home continues to develop new programs to address emerging needs and an ever-changing society. **To provide love and care where it is needed the most.**

For 175 years, the Children’s Home has been a place of healing and hope. Thank you for being a part of our history.

ABOUT US



On January 21, 1847, a group of Poughkeepsie women called the Female Guardian Society met to form the Poughkeepsie Orphan House and Home of the Friendless to care for the poor, abandoned and neglected in their communities, most especially the children. Their belief was that all children deserve a nurturing and caring environment. 175 years later, their work continues.

Today, the Children’s Home of Poughkeepsie provides a full range of Community Based Services, Residential Services, and a Facility Service Dog Program, giving hope and healing to at-risk children and families throughout New York State. The Home is licensed by the NYS Office of Children and Family Services and the Department of Health.

In 2016, the Children’s Home earned re-accreditation from the Council on Accreditation for its exemplary adherence to human welfare agency guidelines. The assessment team declared the Home a stellar agency and a model for others in the field.

THE ROAD HOME

PROVIDING HOPE DURING A TIME OF TRANSITION

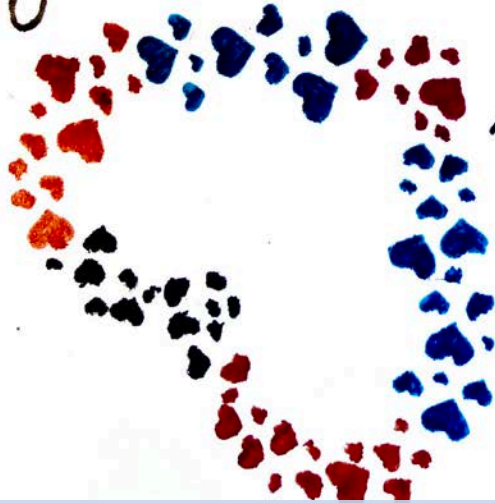
In May of 2018 Tiffany arrived at the Children's Home of Poughkeepsie (CHP) in the Group Emergency Foster Care Program after being removed from her biological family. Although she was only fourteen years old at the time, Tiffany was outgoing, strong-willed and knew how to advocate for herself. During her time at the Children's Home she began to form relationships with a variety of people, including other adolescents in the program and various staff members. Tiffany was well-liked by everyone and was renowned for her vivacious personality. Tiffany's family had a history of being involved in the system, and reuniting with her biological mother would be a long journey. There were numerous attempts at reunification during her two-year stay at the Children's Home. Tiffany and her mother appeared to be on the verge of reuniting several times, only for something to get in the way. Nevertheless, they remained resilient and after months of gradual visits, Tiffany was able to return home to her mother.

Tiffany made the transition back home just as the Children's Home started a new program in their Community Based Services Department. This program, Children and Family Treatment and Support Services (CFTSS) was the perfect fit to help support Tiffany in transitioning back to living with her family in the community. The CFTSS program includes clinical components such as individual and family therapy. This program gives youth the power to improve their health, well-being and quality of life. These services strengthen families and help them make informed

decisions about their care. Tiffany was receptive to the thought of a familiar face visiting her house to help her and her family during this transitional period, and was quickly enrolled into the program. Tiffany continued to participate in CFTSS and used the program for support over several months.

Tiffany and her mother began to experience moments of conflict, and despite her best efforts to keep the family together, Tiffany felt it was better to leave the house and live with her boyfriend and his family. One of the advantages of the CFTSS program is that the services can follow the client through any transition, ensuring continuity of care. Tiffany has been working with the same practitioner since she began receiving services in October of 2019.

Her practitioner, Rebecca, reflects on the work they have done together. *“I’ve had the pleasure of working with Tiffany in a variety of capacities, and I’ve seen her develop into the curious, brave, and strong young woman she is today. Being able to work with Tiffany where she is most comfortable – at home or in the community – has positively impacted her willingness to participate in program services. With the help of this program, she has learned to adapt, build self-awareness and resilience, and learn from these experiences in order to continue working toward her goals.”*

“My work with Rebecca has changed my life. I feel like if I didn’t have Rebecca I would not be where I am today. She has stuck by my side through so many transitions and has helped me be able to survive living in the community on my own.”

Currently, Tiffany is eighteen years old and living independently. She is actively looking for employment and is successfully navigating her community resources to accomplish her goals.

HEALING THROUGH CREATIVE ARTS

The Children's Home's Creative Arts program, consisting of three components, Expressive Arts, Song Factory, and Recreational Arts and Crafts, offers youth the opportunity to express feelings that cannot easily be put into words. Some people may be surprised to learn that state of art trauma treatment, based on findings from neurobiology and neuroscience research, relies on therapies that are less language dependent such as play and expressive arts. In prior decades, the emphasis was on correcting faulty beliefs, thoughts, and cognitions around abuse and trauma and correcting these cognitive distortions along with creating a cohesive narrative of the trauma experience(s) in order to make sense of it and to put it in a new meaningful perspective.

It is now understood in brain research that this high level cognitive and verbal process that takes place in higher centers of the brain, notably the cerebral cortex, can only happen after the physiological storm within the lower centers of the brain such as the brain stem are calmed. The "storm" refers to the hyperarousal in the neurological system which is combined with hypervigilance which organizes the brain to detect any sign of danger or threat. This results in impairment to the stress response system that pumps out stress hormones such as cortisol and adrenaline to prepare for fight, flight or freeze responses as the organism triggers the survival circuits of the brain. The result, particularly if persistent and chronic, is that the stress response system is activated to over respond and to perceive danger and threat but misses a lot of important information essential to healthy development.

The threat detection switchboard of the brain is called the amygdala. The amygdala becomes overactive in youth exposed to high levels of trauma and repeated or chronic trauma. Youth





exposed to this unusually high level and repeated trauma negotiate their everyday life with a radically altered neural system and that is one of the essential facts that anyone working with or even interacting with such children needs to understand. Such a youth may be sitting in the classroom while the math teacher is discussing equations scanning the room for threat, someone making a menacing face, someone staring at him, listening for tone of voice and facial expressions of the teacher to detect if the teacher is stressed or in a bad mood while taking in almost no information about equations.

Emotional dysregulation is the norm with youth with trauma histories. A typical way this is manifested in daily life is through highly emotional episodes in response to trauma triggers. In the new book of interviews between Oprah Winfrey and Bruce Perry, M.D., titled **What Happened to Me**, Dr. Perry, a renowned child psychiatrist who has researched extensively the impact of trauma and abuse on the neurobiology of children, describes a boy who was in a residential placement. He was adjusting well in his living unit and seemed to get along quite well with his peers and staff members and so, as you can imagine, everyone was shocked when he assaulted a very popular teacher. It was mystifying to everyone involved and no one knew how to explain it. Dr. Perry decided to sit in on the class and observe the interactions between the teacher and this youth. During the period of observation, Dr. Perry did not see anything of concern in the quality of interaction. He talked with the teacher after the class to get his perspective. The teacher explained that he did not have an answer as to what could have caused such an alarming and violent episode. He told Dr. Perry that he simply leaned down and looked over the boy's shoulder to help him with his work. Dr. Perry said, "So you leaned over close to the youth, looking over his shoulder. May I ask you what cologne, if any, do you use?" The teacher said, "Old Spice." Prior to this observation in the classroom, Dr. Perry had interviewed the youth and found out that he had experienced severe beatings by his father and his older brother. When Dr. Perry asked him, "What does his father and older brother have in common?" The boy responded, "They both use Old Spice!" The olfactory system is powerful in activating the stress response system when trauma memories are triggered. The teacher stopped using any cologne and there was never a

repeat episode. The brain stem, thalamus, and amygdala are part of the lower brain that needs to be calmed and soothed before the higher level cognitive and verbal processing of trauma can be effective.

Sharon Alexander, an Expressive Arts therapist at the Children’s Home for 6 years and counting, through the generosity of a grant from the Henry Nias Foundation, has been providing state of the art trauma treatment which engages our youth in expressive arts therapy. These are the “bottom up” therapy activities that Dr. Perry has identified that can “calm the brain stem” and soothe the stress response system that eventually allows youth to process trauma experiences in the higher cortical regions of the brain. Our youth love expressive arts because it allows them other forms of creative expression when words are not accessible to them. Joining Sharon these past few years has been James Glasgow, a talented artist and musician/producer, who has created an expressive arts intervention known as “The Song Factory”. James works with our youth to create, write, and record their own music. A number of youth have written songs and recorded them to a CD and are rightly proud of their creative, musical work. Some of the lyrics illustrated the power of this expressive arts intervention to give expression to the trauma experience when direct telling is not possible. The program has been wildly popular with our youth.

A creative arts and “bottom-up” approach to the extensive trauma that many of our youth have experienced allow a young person to calm the physiological storm within the lower centers of the brain, so that they can find meaningful perspective in the cognitive and verbal process that take place in higher centers of the brain. A teen girl may find that after learning to write a song about her trauma, one day she is able to speak openly about it. **She is able to find healing and hope.**



PROGRAM UPDATES



Community Based Services

The Community Based Services department has seen significant growth through the year. The youth and families we serve have increased along with the staff in the department. We continue to provide services in Dutchess, Putnam, Ulster and Orange Counties. One of the biggest changes this year was the obtaining of our licensure through the Office of Mental Health. This licensure allowed us to expand our service provision from youth in the foster care system to all youth in the general mental health population. The rapid growth of the Community Based Services program reflects the scale of need in our community. As the Children's Home of Poughkeepsie rises to the challenge of meeting this need, it is exciting to think of the positive impact we can provide.

Child Welfare Programs

The Child Welfare Programs have experienced significant changes over the last few years, most especially with the Families First Prevention Act. In response to this new federal policy, congregate care settings are being sought out less for youth as the initiative is to keep youth within the home or a lower level of care. As a result, the utilization of our residential programs has decreased. We currently operate two Agency Boarding Homes (ABH), two ABHs for our Safe Harbour Program, and our Supervised Independent Living Program. We are seeing more acute mental health needs for the youth being referred to our programs with a much higher level of complex trauma. Our clinical and case management team works diligently alongside our direct care staff to ensure the high level needs of these youth are met. We are seeing shorter stays in care with youth returning home or stepping down to a lower level of care much faster than before. Working in tandem with our Community Based Services program allows us to ensure discharge planning and wrap-around services are provided to the youth and their family.

Federally Funded Programs

This past year the Nuevas Alas/New Wings – Emergency Shelter program for unaccompanied children increased its bed capacity by 12 beds (50 to 62) and moved from West Park, NY to Poughkeepsie, NY. The youth began to engage in Art Therapy and have been fully enjoying it!

We also opened the Nuevas Alas/New Wings – Long Term Foster Care program. This 12 bed program serves unaccompanied children who have been victims of trafficking, abuse or persecution and who do not have a viable sponsor in the United States. This program focuses on the development of independent living skills, and acculturation to life in the United States. Youth are enrolled in the local public school and receive medical services, life skills classes, individual and group counseling and case management while they work towards securing legal status in the United States.



The Children's Home of Poughkeepsie provides a full range of Residential Services and Community Based Services, giving hope and healing to at-risk children and families throughout New York State. The Home is licensed by the NYS Office of Children and Family Services and the Department of Health.

The Children's Home saw a continued move away from traditional residential care as the agency's population shifted toward more community based care. Community Based Services are offered to children and their families in their own homes and communities.

In fiscal year 2021, there were 108 youth served in Residential Programs licensed by the Office of Children and Family Services (OCFS), 247 families served in Community Based Services and 253 children served in our Federally Funded Programs.

AGENCY UPDATE

OCFS RESIDENTIAL SERVICES

Agency Boarding Homes

The Agency Boarding Home program includes three, six-bed homes, located in residential neighborhoods that provide each adolescent an opportunity to strengthen his/her ability for close interpersonal relations in a home setting and develop skills for independent living.

Campus Residential (RTA)

The Raise the Age program served 16 and 17 year old boys being diverted and is intended to be short-term with enhanced after care services provided to the youth and their family. The program followed an evidenced based model of care appropriate for each individual youth. Vocational training and a robust recreation program were key components of the program. The RTA program closed on April 19, 2021.

Group Emergency Foster Care (GEFC)

This program provided Child Protective Services from several counties with 24-hour availability of residential care for children (birth to 21 years of age) who were in imminent danger if they remained in their homes. The GEFC program closed on January 8, 2021.

Safe Harbour

This program provides services to adolescent girls who are survivors of or at high risk for exploitation and trafficking, and girls that have a complex history of trauma. Safe Harbour is trauma responsive and focuses on the treatment, recovery and healing of the youth.

Supervised Independent Living

The Supervised Independent Living program is a type of foster care that supports youth between the ages of 18 and 21 living on their own in the community in apartments leased by the Children's Home. The program provides a transitional experience for youth who, in most cases, will age out of care at 21.

FEDERALLY FUNDED PROGRAMS

Nuevas Alas/New Wings — Emergency Shelter

The Emergency Shelter program serves refugee children who are fleeing from their countries of origin to seek safety in the United States. The goal of the program is to reunify children with their families as quickly as possible and ensure their safety and well-being. Youth who enter the program receive medical attention, academic instruction, and recreational programming in addition to Case Management and Clinical services.

COMMUNITY BASED SERVICES

Care Management Services

The Children's Home provides Care Management Services as part of the NYS Health Home Care Management Program. Children from birth to age 21, who are Medicaid eligible, receive assistance from a Care Manager to help manage the child's chronic and complex medical or behavioral health condition. The goals of these services are to ensure they have everything necessary to stay healthy, promote wellness, and decrease utilization of the hospital. The Care Manager provides a family centered plan that supports continuity of care and will help families arrange new services if necessary.

Children and Family Treatment and Support Services (CFTSS)

Children and Family Treatment and Support Services, available with NYS Children's Medicaid, give children (under age 21) and their families the power to improve their health, well-being and quality of life. These new mental health services strengthen families and help them make informed decisions about their care. Additionally, the services will help to prevent the need for emergency room visits, hospital stays or out of home placements, such as group homes or campus based. Services are provided in the least restrictive environment for the child or family.

Home and Community Based Services (HCBS)

Home and Community Based Services is a strengths-based program that offers services such as respite, caregiver family support and prevocational skills to youth. The grants are dedicated to funding child-focused adoption recruiters for Wendy's Wonderful Kids (WWK), a signature program of the Foundation. The recruiters work in Dutchess, Ulster and Sullivan counties in New York.

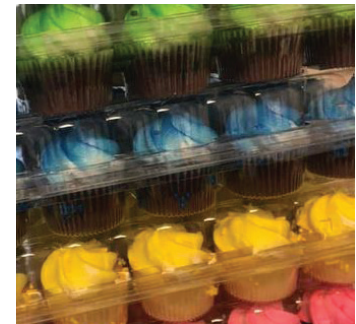

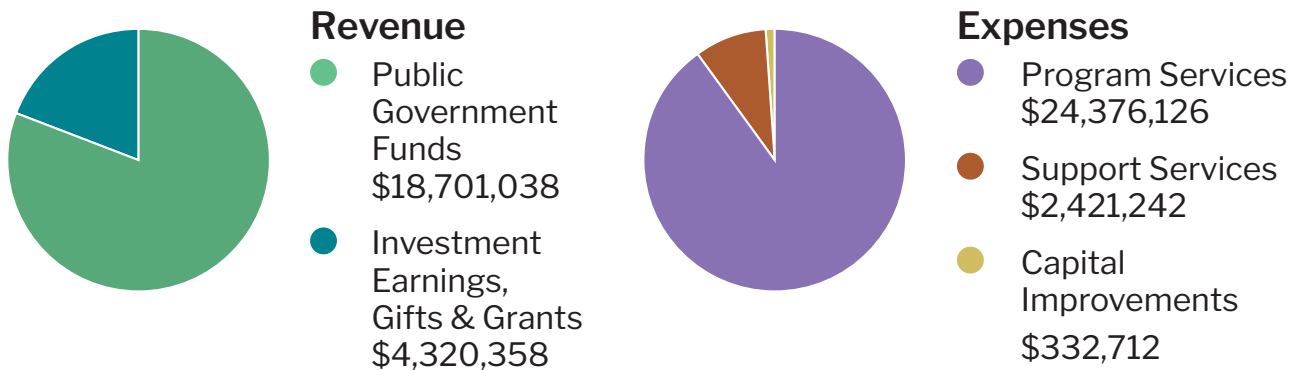

FINANCIAL SUMMARY JULY 1, 2020 – JUNE 30, 2021

Each year the Children’s Home budget is structured with the anticipation of private funding from gifts, grants and interest on investments, added to our State/County revenue stream to produce a balanced budget. These “extra” funds provide for increased services to youth, including additional social workers, direct care staff, art and music therapy and our Facility Service Dog Program. Funds also support cultural and recreational activities for youth, special services to families, and enhanced services to youth transitioning to independence. The Children’s Home relies on community support to ensure that children receive the best care. We are incredibly grateful to all of our donors for their support and commitment to our mission.



DONATIONS

The fiscal year 2021 ended with **\$440,639** in total donations. The Annual Appeal brought in **\$226,662** in gifts from individuals, businesses and foundations. Event revenue*, bequests, grants and restricted gifts made up the difference.

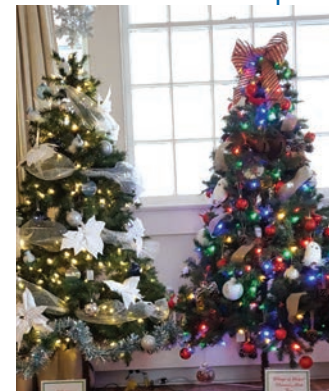

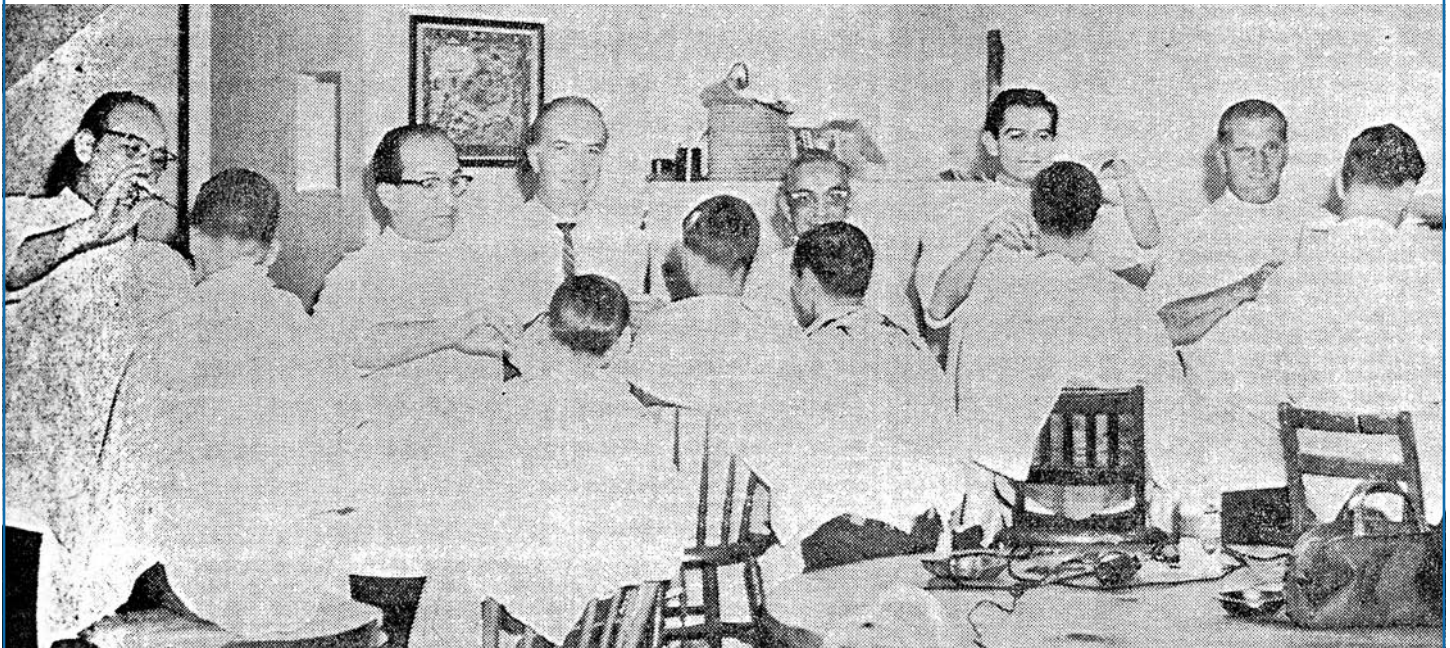
